


<u>Golf Cart Paths</u>— No walking, riding bicycles or golf carts for sightseeing is allowed on the golf cart paths during golfing hours. Shareholders and guests accompanied by shareholders may walk or use golf carts on the paths during non-golfing hours. No pets or bicycles allowed on the golf course. Violators are subject to golf course fines.

<u>Wildlife</u> - Alligators are not to be fed or taunted in any area within Sweetwater. Alligators or snakes that become a nuisance should be reported to the Corporation Business Office for removal. <u>Do not set feed out</u> to attract unwanted wildlife in any area within Sweetwater. Failure to do so will result in the cost of securing the residency being charged to the homeowner, at the then prevailing rate.



We're very pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our water source is ground water from two (2) wells. The wells draw from the Floridan Aquifer. Our water is obtained from ground water sources and is chlorinated for disinfection purposes.

The Department of Environmental Protection performed a Source Water Assessment in 2022 on our system. These assessments were conducted to provide information about any potential sources of contamination in the vicinity of our wells. There are three (3) potential sources of contamination identified for this system — a Delineated Area with a susceptibility score of 33.33 and a Moderate level of concern — Two (2) domestic wastewater Facility & Site with susceptibility score of 0.03 and a low level of concern. The assessment results are available on the FDEP Source Water Assessment and Protection Program website at www.dep.state.fl.us/swapp.

Sweetwater Community routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. While your drinking water meets EPA's standard for arsenic, it does contain low levels of arsenic. EPA's standard balances the current understanding of arsenic's possible health effects against the costs of removing arsenic from drinking water. EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.
