

I also purchased another 12x12 canopy and wind screens for this event. That leaves the committee \$557.63 to work with.

My goal this year is to use the money to make upgrades to the grounds and building at the marina. I have consulted with the liaison for that amenity and he agrees to work together to make improvements to the area. I want the entire community to use and enjoy the waterfront. What a beautiful view and peaceful park.

Application for use of the Clubhouse

Local Food Donations

We saw place-mats and purses, newly learned quilt squares and up and coming quilts. Discussion took place regarding what the summer will bring... with many of our members headed north, the quilters here year-round will be working together on projects, planning breakfasts/lunches to discuss our fabric stashes and more.

Mike Kahn-Reminder when you leave to fill out form with who is taking care of your home. Channel 732 is online. Scams-be aware Microsoft and jury duty. Areas of responsibility are complete and were in the last sweet times or you can pick one up at the office. We have agreed on a contract with Spectrum and it will include 3 high definition boxes and you can upgrade to a DVR for one of them, increasing the speed to 500 MB, extra channels including an entertainment and sports package. We decreased the monthly rate as well. When it comes into effect we will let you know.

<u>Anita Love</u>-Thank you for keeping the pool area clean. Be aware of the rules around the pool. In the exercise room we are in need of a small table to hold supplies for the Bo-Flex machine. Please put things away when finished. Looking into a new bicycle.

<u>Mike Longyear</u>-The Architectural Committee has replaced Russell Reints with David Kuhl. When using the dog park or marina road dog walk please pick up after your pet.

Jeanette DeLisi-The 35th Anniversary party was well received. Thank you to SW for the commemorative pens. Social Club events-4/23 Poker run 3-5, 5/6 Derby Day 2pm, 5/28 Dance party 7-10, and 5/28 Mother/Fathers Day celebration 7am. A light pole out front was replaced thanks to Jim Morin and John Johnson for moving and repairing. We saved about \$2000 not having to purchase a new one. Thanks to Jim Caldwell for repairing a leak under the kitchen sink. Ruth and I attempting to get the kitchen up and running. Register at the office if you are interested in taking the food handler class. When scheduling events in the community apply with a reservation form.

<u>Don Morris-</u>Completing last fiscal year to close out for audit. The reserve committee met with some of the BOD to review what they have been working on. BOD will further review. Thank the team for all their hard work.

Steve Gade-Boat docks 1 and 2 are not for storage, drop off only. Going to re-number the dock area. Aeration is in process. The greens roller needs to be replaced. Working with the golf board on holes #5,7,8 & 9 to make repairs. T-boxes-fill in with sod. #14 has rotted railroad ties, going to replace some. #4 when it dries out going to finish cutting down the stumps and weeds. Greens will be getting cut now every other weekend day every other week. Patty Laney spoke for the social club-the BOD approved a storage container in the storage area. We have approved to spend up to \$7000. It will be painted the same color as the maintenance building. It will be 40' by 8.5' by 9.5' and the BOD will not be charging for storage. Jawna Reints spoke about CERT. We can assist with vaccines if an epidemic happens again or flu shots. All volunteers are trained and we need nurses or anyone in the medical field. Security-you need to be 16 years old to drive a golf cart. Do not stand on the back of golf carts. Don't go out looking for alligators. Use flashlights at night.

Ruth Freer-Working on landscaping. Laura Dufault gave report on butterfly group. We now have 6 gardens. Three new money makers, saving aluminum cans, selling seed packets and raffling off 2 butterfly doormats. Bill Lantz gave report on Pro Shop. We need volunteers to fish out golf balls from the water areas. Last month we had \$7070 in golf ticket sales and \$981 in grips and merchandise. Leagues are growing and thanks to all group leaders. May 1st hours will change to closing at 11AM. We have new merchandise to sell. Lucille Spaulding gave report for resales. We have had 9 homes close this year and the average value is \$168,700. When homes were manufactured tags and compliant certificates were on or in each home as required. They contained needed HUD information. They are usually in the master closet and on the metal frame. Some homes have closed without them.

Lois Steiniger-Garbage and litter on 17/92 is terrible. M-emailed county sanitation and we are waiting for them to clean it up.

Betsy Dykeman-Whose responsibility is it to pick up the white rocks spilled outside the entrance. R-a resident went out and swept up the mess.

Anna Records-A few years ago we had a group of volunteers that went outside the gates and picked up trash on our property.

Rolly Laprise- Is there a time limit on doing repairs at your home? J-there is no time limit in our rules.

CROSSROADS VILLAGE UPDATE - HC LOCATION IS ACROSS FROM BALMORAL RESORT ON HWY 27 Black Mountain Group (BMG) paid \$5 million in March for 120 acres to create Crossroad Village Center - a mixed-use community at one of the busiest intersections along the U.S. 27 corridor in eastern Polk County. Zoning and plans for Crossroad were approved by the Haines City Commission in 2021. Orlando-based BMG has updated them by cutting the number of phases from five to two and adding multifamily urban living above the retail space. Phase 1 would include the 450,000 square feet of commercial development plus the mixed-use buildings with at least 4 stories of multifamily residential above ground level retail, BMG partner Syed Raza told GrowthSpotter. The updated plan also includes 48,000 square-feet of office space above retail. Two hotels have signed on and negotiations are underway for the eight outparcels, the mixed-use retail space and a grocery store, he said. "After Posner, this is the most logical and busiest intersection coming up," Raza said. Located at southwest corner of U.S. 27 and U.S. 17-92, 35 miles southwest of Orlando and 58 miles east of Tampa, the area sees about 100,000 cars a day, he said. "The migration of Florida continues to take place at a fast pace," Raza said. "This area continues to see new development. "Florida was the fastestgrowing state in 2022, per a Census Bureau report. At Crossroad, in Phase 1, BMG will break ground and start construction on the lakes. The mass grading will take 6-9 months. The hotel flags - Marriott Townplace Suites and Wyndham Hotels & Resorts - likely will be first to go vertical, Raza said, with the retail stores opening in 2025. The Marriott will have 100-110 rooms; the Wyndham 120-140, he said. BMG plans two L-shaped elevator-served buildings that will hold the retail shops and about 220 multifamily homes. Raza said 60% of the units will face the lake and an amphitheater, and the other 40% would face the planned promenade and plaza, Raza said. The buildings are shown in an updated concept plan flanked by a restaurant on each end. Each building would also have its own parking garage. A small park and multiple water features also will be built. "It's a very modern and upscale architecture with use of a lot of glass and stone and wood features," Raza said of the planned multi-family units. Two-bedroom apartments will be 950-1000 square feet; 3-bedroom will be 1,250-1,350 square feet. BMG would either hire a management company or sell them. "It's very similar to Crane's Roost in Altamonte Springs," Raza said. Building multi-family with the commercial fills a need in the area and "they are customers for those retail shops. And customers want to live in that environment where they don't' have to drive. It's a live play and work concept." A 50,000 square-foot grocery was shifted from the U.S. 27 frontage to an internal lot, with outparcels and anchor stores along the main highway. Raza declined to name the national grocery chain or national retail chains in negotiations with the developer. BMG submitted its updated plans by VHB to the Haines City for review and is waiting on state permits from South Florida Water Management District and Florida Department of Transportation. BMG continues its financing negotiations with lenders, Raza said. Phase 2 remains the same as originally submitted by Dave Schmitt Engineering, for now, Raza said. That plan includes 119 single-family detached homes ranging from 2,000 to 3,000 square feet homes and 169 townhomes. Both neighborhoods as planned would be served by a centrally located amenity center with a clubhouse, pool, basketball courts and tennis courts. "This is a very fluid market, so we make those decisions on what the conditions are at the time," Raza said.

REMINDERS:

1- GUESTS:

Any resident with a guest under the age of 50 must register them in the office if they are in the community for 2 weeks or more. Guests under the age of 50 can only be a guest for a maximum of 30 days within a 12 month period.

2-EVENT SCHEDULING: Use of any area in the community including golf course.

Apply for a reservation form from the office - you can not just assume the area you are interested in will be readily available. When booking an event on a weekend, please check the sweetimes, bulletin boards and 732 to see what is going on that weekend; if there are 2 or 3 other events held on one weekend - that has an impact on attendance. We want to avoid double bookings and also prevent the residents from having to chose what they are able to attend. Keep in mind when planning an event on a Friday afternoon, we have our info meetings and bod meetings the 2nd and 3rd Fridays of the month.
